Kudos to FF/PM Tony LeMaster for organizing our annual SCAC Christmas Family donations on his personal time.


Kudos to FF/PM Jake Roop for providing us with extra holiday cheer with his "Flick" flagpole decoration.

Kudos to FF/EMT Jordan Holbrook for creating "Through the Lock" props and training plan.



EMS RECEIVED = 1


Significant Response Activity

On 12/1/18 @ 20:00 hours, Crews responded to North State Route 741 for a reported overdose. Upon arrival, crews found a 35-year-old male unresponsive and pulseless. Crews initiated ALS protocol but the patient remained in cardiac arrest. Medical control provided a field termination of resuscitation order. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Warren County Sheriff.

On 12/5/18 @ 20:30 hours, Crews responded to Old State Route 122 for a reported non-breather. Upon arrival, crews found a 92-year-old female DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Clearcreek PD.

On 12/6/18 @ 19:15 hours, Crews responded to Villa Pointe Drive for a reported non-breather. Upon arrival, crews found a 93-year-old male unresponsive and not breathing. Crews initiated ALS protocol but the patient remained in cardiac arrest. Medical control provided a field termination of resuscitation order. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 12/9/18 @ 15:45 hours, Crews responded to West State Route 122 for a rollover MVA. Upon arrival, crews found a vehicle that rolled multiple times with an unresponsive patient in the vehicle. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Atrium Medical Center.

On 12/10/18 @ 07:11 hours, Crews responded to Iris Trail for a reported smoke odor. Upon arrival, crews found all occupants evacuated and reporting a burnt smell from the master bedroom vent. Crews investigated the entire house and HVAC system but found no smoke odor or evidence of fire.

On 12/13/18, as a member of Warren County's Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Chief Agenbroad attended the annual LEPC Training and Exercise meeting along with their quarterly meeting.

On 12/20/18, Chief Agenbroad attended the Warren County Child Assessment and Response Evaluation (CARE) Pilot Program kickoff meeting. This program, initiated by Warren County and funded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance, is a rapid response intervention for children who are present on the scene of an overdose involving a parent or loved one. The goal of CARE is to identify children who need assistance in coping with trauma and provide a comprehensive family-centered plan to address their needs and decrease the likelihood of substance abuse transference.

Heating Safety



There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you **smell** gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.
