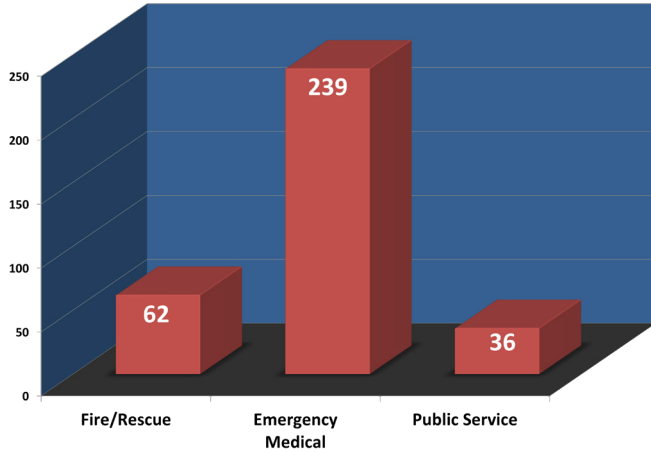

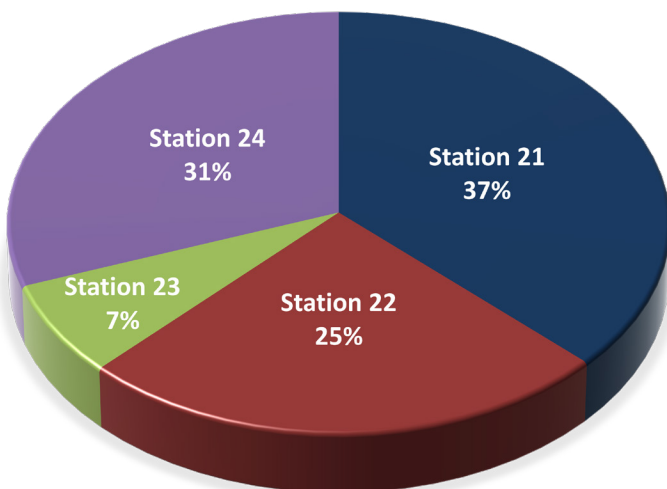
Alarms by Service Type

2024 = 06:11	2024 = 06:16

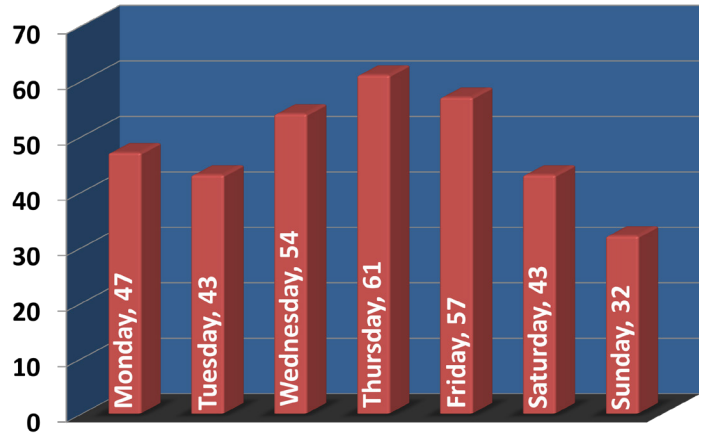
Response Percentages

Significant Responses

On 5/4/25 at 15:21 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with CPR in progress. Crews initiated ALS procedures with no response from the patient. Medical Control provided a field termination of resuscitation efforts order.



On 5/11/25 at 13:04 hours, crews responded to a business for a reported motor vehicle accident with injuries. While enroute, dispatch informed crews one vehicle crashed into a building with a person trapped. Upon arrival, crews found two vehicles involved in a crash; both cars were away from the building. Crews noted a hole in the wall from vehicle impact and fluids on the parking lot. Crews stabilized the vehicles and extricated one occupant. After all occupants were out of the cars, crews transported one patient to Kettering Health Franklin. Crews secured the site of hazards and released the scene to Springboro PD.



On 5/15/25 at 22:59 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Miami Valley South.

On 5/17/25 at 11:54 hours, crews responded to a business for a reported gas leak. Upon arrival, crews found a skid steer loader that slid on top of a gas line. Crews noted a strong odor of natural gas in the area, including inside the building. Crews used meters to locate the highest concentration of gas and used fans to pressurize the area and prevent the leak from entering attic space. While waiting for Duke to arrive on-site, crews shut off the gas line from the road and ventilated the building. The representative from Duke Energy confirmed that the gas line was shut off and crews released the scene to the building superintendent.



On 5/19/25 at 17:53 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Atrium Medical Center.

On 5/27/25 at 16:51 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a residential structure with nothing showing and all occupants evacuated. Further investigation showed a small fire in the basement from a sump pump explosion. Crews secured the breaker to the sump pump and extinguished the fire using a pressurized water can. Crews performed ventilation and contacted Duke Energy to shut off gas lines. Wayne Township provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property damage from the fire is \$200.



On 5/29/25 at 21:13 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a residential building with nothing showing. Upon investigation, crews found smoke haze inside the building coming from an overheated sump pump in the basement. Crews disconnected power to the sump pump and performed ventilation. Miami Valley Fire District provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property damage due to fire is \$200.

On 5/31/25 at 12:47 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported brush fire. Upon arrival, crews found a dumpster on fire. Investigation showed a small fire pit near the dumpster, with burned materials, but the fire was contained to the dumpster. Crews extinguished the fire and performed overhaul.



On 5/31/25 at 21:43 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Turtlecreek Township for a reported vehicle accident with injuries. Upon arrival, crews found a single car crashed with the occupant entrapped. The car was wedged between trees, restricting access to the driver. Crews contacted a towing company to move the car. When the car was clear of the trees, crews extricated the occupant. After extricating the driver, crews returned to service.
