On 1/23/26, Captain Prass completed a sprinkler inspection at American Battery on Ovonic Way in Springboro.




Alarms by Service Type


Response Percentages

Significant Responses

On 1/5/25 at 23:23 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined that the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 1/9/26 at 22:24 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported choking. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with CPR in progress. Crews initiated ALS procedures. Medical control gave orders to discontinue resuscitation efforts in accordance with the patient's Living Will. After terminating care, crews released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 1/11/26 at 08:30 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a two-story residential building with nothing showing and all occupants out of the house. Upon entry, crews encountered smoke in the primary bedroom. Further investigation revealed a heat signature at the bedside table, where a lithium battery had caught fire and was subsequently extinguished by smothering. Crews removed the table from the building and performed ventilations. Wayne Township Fire Department provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property loss due to the fire is \$500.

On 1/14/26 at 12:43 hours, crews responded to State Route 122 for a reported traffic collision with entrapment. Upon arrival, crews found two vehicles involved in a crash with one occupant entrapped. Crews stabilized the cars and extricated one person. Crews transported two patients to Atrium Medical Center. Crews mitigated roadway hazards and released the scene to Clearcreek PD.



On 1/15/26 at 15:55 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a shed near the house on fire with heavy smoke. Additionally, crews found a car located between the shed and the house completely engulfed in fire. Crews initiated an attack on the fire extension into the garage and then to the fully involved vehicle. After extinguishing both fires, crews checked for heat signatures and extension into the primary residence. Lebanon Fire Department provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property loss due to the fire is \$37,000.



On 1/20/26 at 07:44 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 1/26/26 at 09:39 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a two-story residential structure with heavy fire along the chimney. Crews initiated exterior fire attack on the chimney, then positioned for interior attack to extinguish heavy fire in the attic and in the bathroom connected to the primary bedroom. After extinguishing the fire, crews performed salvage and overhaul. Lebanon Fire Department, Turtlecreek Township, and Wayne Township provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property damage due to the fire is \$175,000.



On 1/27/26 at 11:36 hours, crews responded to Park Lane for a reported passenger vehicle fire. Upon arrival, crews found a car on fire in the roadway with no exposures. Crews used a handline to extinguish the fire in the engine compartment and foam to extinguish the fire in the passenger compartment. Crews checked for heat signatures and performed overhaul. The estimated property damage due to the fire is \$7,500.






Excellence Through Training

Fire and Rescue Training

Crews completed fire competency training on Personal Protective Equipment and Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus. January's training was completed using the window and roof-edge props built into the Station 24 designated training area. Individual members deployed and set up the 24' extension ladder, demonstrating proper placement, halyard control, and climbing angles. The controlled environment at Station 24 allowed members to focus on precision, efficiency, and consistency across all evolutions.



EMS Training

Crews completed one hour of EMS training focused on Acute Psychosis and an additional hour on Treating Neck and Spinal Injuries through the FireRescue1 Academy.

Prevention Training

Fire Inspectors completed continuing education focused on preplan review of Lake Court Medical, located at 305 South Pioneer Boulevard. This training was uploaded to the FireRescue1 Academy for district-wide access.

Company Training

Crews participated in quarterly Blue Card size-up professional development training centered on strip mall fires.

Special Topics

EMS Supervisors successfully completed competency training for all on-duty personnel on maintaining an airway using multiple airway adjuncts, including the King Airway and Endotracheal tube. Additional guidance was provided on Capnography, which included how to read wave forms:

ETCO₂ less than 35 mmHg = "Hyperventilation"
(Too much oxygen)

ETCO₂ greater than 45 mmHg = "Hypoventilation"
(Not enough oxygen)

Off-Site Training

Lieutenant Tim Haggard attended Suicide Intervention Skills Training on January 28 and 29 at the City of Columbus Union Hall.
